



5 Francis Gibson's plan of the Yorkshire Coast & WHITBY, 1803

This Plan and APPEARANCE of the YORKSHIRE-COAST AT THREE MILES DISTANCE FROM HIGH-WHITBY to SANDSEND-NESS, with the truest respect, is inscribed to the Hon^{ble} Lieut: Colonel AUGUSTUS PHIPPS by his obliged Servant FRANCIS GIBSON.

WHITBY is situated in Latitude 54° 29' N. and 1° 51' W. 5 Leagues N.W. from SCARBOROUGH: It is a Bar-Harbour, nearly dry at low Water, Neap Tides, the flow is from 9 to 10 Feet; in Spring Tides from 16 to 18 Feet. It is protected by two Piers built of large masses of freestone. The West, in a line with the current of the River Esk, is 665 Yards in length: The East, as built from the South-shore is nearly at right angles with the other but much shorter, between them lies the entrance of the Harbour 22.5 feet wide. From the Pier-heads the Harbour runs SW. to the Drawbridge which connects the two equal parts of the Town: Above the Bridge it expands and at full Tide forms a large Basin skirted by The Dry Docks and various Slips for ship-building. The River Esk is navigable for Sloops and Barges, Two Miles above the Town, where the flowing of the Tide is checked by a Mill-dam across the River. The population of WHITBY and its attached Townships amounts to nearly 15,000 Souls. Within the Harbour are usually 20 Vessels on the stocks from 90 to 600 Tons. From 5 to 10 in the dry docks and coaling Places repairing: Its Imports are Timber, Hemp, Iron, Coal &c. Exports alum, canvas for the use of the Navy, Ships, Oil, whale-bone, Bacon, Hams, Butter &c. Register Tonnage of the shipping of WHITBY 10330. Revenue transmitted into the Exchequer from 8 to 9000 £.
